- --Howard Voegeli named outstanding young farmer of Green county at annual Farmer's Recognition Night held in Monroe.
- --School officials expect 120 new rural grade pupils to enter Monticello Schools this fall, result of closing rural schools.
- --Fred Escher purchases Marina at Lake Wisconsin.
- --Marianne Burgy and Gary Zweifel are chosen to Attend Badger Girls and Boys State camp.
- --Mrs. Harry Schuerch and Dean Zimmerman hospitalized with injuries resulting from collision of Schuerch and Zimmerman autos.
- --Forty six young people confirmed at Zwingli UCC.
- --130 youngsters participate in annual Easter Egg hunt.
- --Jeanne Elmer and Terry Freitag reign as Queen and King of Monticello prom. (Now Jeanne Kubly-Jerry)
- --Fred Deppeler, age 85, former Monticello cheesemaker dies. (Father of Albert Deppeler).
- --Elmer Duerst, Monticello native engaged to coach basketball in Colorado.
- --116 persons attend Mother-Daughter Tea.
- --Donald Hoppe resigns as Monticello Chief of Police, Dwight Zweifel is named Chief of Police.
- -- Candace Buehl named 1962 Monticello Dairy Queen.
- --75th anniversary of Zwingli UCC observed.

- --Monticello Cold Storage building sold to Ed Rufenacht and Rudolph Regez of Monroe. The building erected in 1916 by cheese firm of Edw. Wittwer and Bro. is one of the largest cheese warehouses in Green County. Last partners were Dwight Zweifel and Donald Knobel who discontinued business. Will continue as Monticello Cold Storage.
- --Karl Freitag acquires Schuler Insurance Agency.
- --Eldon Taylor assumes management of Cities Service station.
- --Harold Schultz suffers burns and bruises when injured in sewer disposal plant explosion here.
- --Total enrollment in Monticello Schools hits record of 509 students.
- --C.M. Stauffer defeats G. Fred Galli and Victor Schiller for state assembly nomination, is re-elected as Green County assemblyman.
- --Funeral services for Mrs. L.R. Pease, age 74, wife of local businessman. (Pease Hardware)
- --Darlyne (Elmer) Wuethrich and William Koller killed in one-car accident just south of town.
- --Over 160 attend Father-Son banquet.
- --Fred C. Durtschi named new Fire Chief, succeeds Ervin Broge who resigned after serving 10 years.
- --Fritz Benkert, age 13, bags 10 point buck with bow and arrow.
- -- Cash donations for Monticello Lake development project surpass \$3000 mark.
