
The Oak Shade School is now located at the Swiss Historical Village in New Glarus.

MONTICELLO BUSINESSMEN TO STAGE HUGE PRE-CHRISTMAS SALE

Enthusiastic crowds are expected to attend this event. The sensational bargain event of the season will take place Friday and Saturday November 20 -21 when the businessmen join hands in sponsoring two big Dollar Days. Extensive plans are being made to make this big two-day event one of the greatest in the town's history. This big price slashing event comes as a preholiday sale and follows on the heels of a similar affair held last month when Monticello streets were virtually humming with enthusiastic shoppers. At this time residents of the Monticello territory will have a golden opportunity of making purchases at remarkably low prices that will mean substantial savings. Nothing can be spared to bring people to Monticello in large droves for Dollar Days. With the attractive bargains which will be offered by the local stores shoppers have more than one reason for doing their buying here in Monticello. With Christmas only six weeks away it might be well worth your time to investigate these tempting offers. It's never too early to be thinking about Christmas gifts. Dishes, pans, gloves and all sorts of quality merchandise will be on sale


all at substantial bargains. Moreover, all the merchandise offered by the merchants on Dollar Days is of the highest quality, No inferior goods bought especially for this sale.

The following history of Monticello was researched by Karen Brugger

ICE HOUSE-ICE HARVEST

1887--A good ice house would be a good investment. The crop is handy and the railroads and village people need a supply of ice.

January 1907--Determined to get into the limelight of publicity, Ira Pierce took an early morning bath in the icy waters of Lake Staedtler this morning. He was engaged in getting things ready for days cut of ice when he slipped on a chunk of ice and landed squarely on his back in the water. He got a thorough soaking. Not to be outdone in a little matter of this kind, John Snow attempted the same stunt a few minutes later but managed to scramble out of the water before the immersion was complete. Work of filling the big ice house is nearly completed, ice about 15 inches thick but quality not up to that of last year, the recent thaw and consequent freeze-up giving the crystals a streak of yellow.

January 1916--Henry Staedtler who has a large

force of men at work on the ice for a number of days expects to complete the harvest tonight. Mr. Staedtler started his harvest before the first of the year, but insistent butting in on the part of the weatherman since that time has delayed matters considerably. Because of a couple soft spells, it has been necessary to plough the ice three times since the campaign began. The first cutting was 11 inches thick, and since then nearly 22 inches thick. The ice is of excellent quality. Mr. Staedtler has the contract for cutting an delivering 1000 tons of ice for the Borden Condensed Milk Company. Note: The Borden Company is paying \$1.35 per hundred for milk testing 3 percent butterfat.

September 1935--Monticello's old red ice house which has served the community for many years has been "sentenced to death." Charles W. Clark, local real estate agent, who has owned the property for the past 12 years is having the structure torn down. No ice has been harvested from the local lake for the past three years because conditions are no longer favorable.


