William G. Meier

William G. Meier was born in Mt. Pleasant township, the son of John and Anna Meier. His father, a Swiss immigrant was regarded as one of the best Swiss limburger cheesemakers of the area having made cheese for 46 years. Bill attended Monticello schools and married Bernece Behnke in 1930 at Dubugue, Iowa. They farmed in Mt. Pleasant township until son Robert married and took over the family farm. The Meier's then moved to a smaller farm in Exeter township remaining there until moving to the Village in 1985 to the former Williard Prisk bungalow on East Lake Avenue. Bernece passed away in 1988, the couple having been married 58 years.

Bill kept a large flock of chickens on the Exeter farm and would deliver fresh eggs to Village residents and the restaurant, stopping by the Village Tap (Dick Rufener, prop.) mornings for a pool game or two. He soon assumed the name "Deadbank Willie." Other players were Fritz Minder, John Matzke, Hollis Baebler, Wittwer Bros., Harry Schuerch, Buckets among others. Maynard Hefty recalls being among the "youngest" and working during the week but had to arrive an hour early on Sunday to get a table. Terry Wichser relates not being a player but a "cheerleader." After some time it was decided to hold a "Deadbank Willie" invitational in late winter or early spring at Hokie's Place (now Eagle Pass). It would be double elimination, partners drawn out of a hat. Maynard recalls 32 players (16 teams) at one tournament. MAHS has one of the promo caps denoting 10th annual (2001). Bill passed away in 1998 so this did become a "Memorial" event. Roy Wittwer was the winner of the first held in 1991. Village Tap was then located where Gempeler's Supermarket is today, later moving to the site of the present Sugar River Bakery. It was also noted that there was a float in a Homecoming parade complete with a pool table denoting the tournament.

Bill and Bernece had a daughter Mardell and son Robert. He served on the Zwingli UCC church consistory, had many friends and was well respected. He passed away at home and is buried in Highland Cemetery.

MISSION STATEMENT


