John Ammann, 59, Dies Monday While Working in Field Heart Attack Proves Fatal While Making Hay at Gempeler Farm.

Suffering a sudden heart attack while assisting with haying operations at the Fred Gempeler farm, about two miles southwest of Monticello, John Ammann, a resident of the Monticello community for the past 10 years, died unexpectedly at 3 o'clock Monday afternoon.

Mr. Ammann, who was 59 years of age, had been in failing health for the past several months.

Mr. Ammann was a native of Racine and was born July 28, 1886. He was united in marriage Feb. 20, 1909 to Tena Knipschild, the ceremony taking place in Monroe. Mr. and Mrs. Ammann farmed in the vicinity of Juda for 24 years and moved to the former Henry F. Kubly farm, about two miles east of Monticello, in 1936. They retired from farming last spring and moved to Monticello March 1, moving into the former Daley house on Railroad avenue, which they purchased last winter.

Surviving, besides the bereaved widow, are two daughters, Mrs. Willis Kopp, Albany, and Mrs. Jacob Wieland, Beloit; one son, Pfc. Willard Ammann, Lowry Field, Colo., who arrived here the last of the week on furlough; one brother, Carl Ammann, Poughkeepsie, N. Y.; one sister, Mrs. George Hoth, Evanston, Ill., and several grandchildren.

Funeral Friday

Funeral services will be conducted at 2 Friday afternoon in Grace Evangelical church, the Rev. W. J. Abe, church pastor, will officiate, and burial will be in Greenwood cemetery, Monroe.

The body will be at the Voegeli funeral home here until noon Friday, at which time it will be removed to the scene of the services later in the day. Pallbearers will be Henry F. Kubly, Monroe, and Abe Kubly, William Spring, Henry O. Krueger, Vinzenz Baebler, and Wilbert Strahm, all neighbors.
