Adolph Ammon, 60, Killed on Highway; Rites Held Tuesday Former Local Butcher is Killed Instantly When Hit by Car

Adolph Ammon, 60 years of age, Milwaukee, and a former meat market operator in Monticello, was killed at 8:15 Friday evening when he was struck by a car while walking along the highway one mile east of Menomonee Falls.

Death came instantly, the result of a skull fracture. The Waukesha county coroner investigated the accident and the driver was not held.

Native of Switzerland

Adolph Ammon was born in Switzerland, the son of Rudolph and Verena Hiltbold Ammon. He attended school in Switzerland and came to the United States in 1913, settling in Monticello, where he worked as a butcher. He enlisted for World War I service on May 24, 1918, and served overseas in France with Co. G, 131st Engineers. He received his discharge in June, 1919, at Camp Grant, Ill. After returning from the war he owned and operated a butcher shop here until 1924. Due to a service disability, he lived at Milwaukee and Wood since leaving Monticello.

Surviving are four brothers, Ernest and Fred, Monroe, John, Winslow, Ill., and Rudolph, Monticello; and two sisters, Mrs. Walter Henning, New Glarus, and Anna in Switzerland.

Mr. Ammon was a member of the Monticello Union lodge No. 155, and Milwaukee Post No. 1, American Legion.

Funeral services were held at 2 Tuesday afternoon in the Voegeli funeral home. The Rev. A. R. Achtemeier, pastor of the Zwingli Evangelical and Reformed church, officiated. Burial was in Highland cemetery with Masonic services at the graveside and Legion squad and escort.
