

**Orville A. Anderson**  
**Sept. 2, 1917 - Apr. 13, 1967**  
**Anderson Rites To Be Monday**  
**Painter, Decorator Dies at Madison**

MONTICELLO (Times Special) — Orville A. Anderson, 49, Monticello painter and decorator, died Thursday night at 10:30 at the Madison Veterans' Hospital. He had been in failing health the past three years.

He was born on a farm in Primrose Township, Dane County, on Sept. 2, 1917. His parents were Alvin T. and Gena Lindocken Anderson. He attended rural schools in Tyvand, Dane County. He was married in Monticello on Jan. 21, 1942 to the former Velma M. Elmer by the Rev. A. R. Achtemeier.

He entered military service in Dane County and was inducted at Ft. Sheridan, Ill., on Aug. 28, 1942. He served with the army in the ETO and was seriously wounded in action near Paris in August, 1944. He served with the Keystone Division. He spent two years in military hospitals in England and United States and was discharged in July, 1946.

He lived in the Mt. Horeb area from 1946 to 1951 and started in the painting and decorating line. In 1951 he came to Monticello, taking up residence there in 1953.

Mr. Anderson is survived by his wife, Velma, his father, Alvin T. Anderson, Blanchardville; three daughters, Mrs. Dennis L. Field, Beloit, Barbara, a senior in high school, and Maryanne, a sophomore student; three sons, Larry, Charles, and Richard, all at home; two brothers, S. Nordeen Anderson, Chicago, and William Anderson, Blanchardville; a sister, Mrs. Fred (Gladys) Yaeger, New Glarus, and two grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by his mother on Sept. 13, 1966, and a granddaughter, Lisa Michelle Field, Jan. 15, 1964.

He was a member of the Amstutz-Marty American Legion Post, Monticello, and the Zwingli United Church of Christ. He was confirmed in the Primrose Church in 1931.

Funeral services will be held Monday at 2 p.m. in the Zwingli United Church of Christ. Rev. J. Allan Mittler will officiate. Burial will be in Highland cemetery where military rites will be conducted by the Amstutz-Marty American Legion Post.
