**IN LAST LONG SLEEP.**

**Mrs. J. H. Barlow Passes Away After Weeks of Patient Suffering.**  
**October 6, 1874 – June 1906**

A veil of sorrow hung over the entire community on Wednesday morning last, when the sorrowful news of the death of Mrs. J. H. Barlow became known. Weakened by the strain upon her system of six long weeks of suffering, she sought peaceful repose in death just as the dawn of another day was shedding its rays of light over the crests of the eastern hills. Her final illness, which had for its termination such a sorrowful ending, dates back to the 29th of April, when she gave birth to a little daughter. The advent of the little one was to her a moment of supreme joy, but little did she or her friends then realize that this joy was destined to be of such short duration. Little did they dream that in the birth of the little one the cost would fall so heavily upon its mother, that she would so soon be called upon to depart forever from the one whom she would have learned to cherish above all else, and from the other loved ones that were near and dear to her. But fate had decreed that such should be the ending, and the best of medical skill, together with loving and tender care, were unable to stem the tide that was gradually taking her nearer the other shore. At times she would rally and her condition would become quite encouraging, but she suffered several sinking spells and all hopes of her recovery were finally abandoned.

Nora Lindstrom was born October 6, 1874, at the home of her parents, John A. and Marian Lindstrom, in Arendal, Norway, coming to America with her parents in early life. She came to Monticello about four years ago and engaged in the millinery business, which she successfully conducted for the two years following. She was married to Joseph H. Barlow, the 9th of January 1904. Besides her husband and infant daughter, she is survived by four step-children, a father advanced in years, residing at Oconto; two sisters, Mrs. Edward O'Donnell, of Idaho, and Miss Emily Lindstrom, of Madison, Wis., besides a number of other relatives. In their great bereavement they have the sympathy of all.

The deceased was highly esteemed by all who had the pleasure of her acquaintance and in her death the community loses one who will be sadly missed by all. She was a member of the Episcopal church and of the Women's Relief Corps, which order attended the funeral in a body and assisted in the last sad rites.

The funeral was held at her late home on Friday, June 8, conducted by the pastor of the Advent Christian church, assisted by Rev. Hints, of the M. E. church. Many beautiful floral offerings were in evidence, which bore silent testimony of her sterling worth. Her remains were laid to rest in the Monticello cemetery. The services were largely attended.
