John Buehler Jan. 23, 1888 - 1924 JOHN BUEHLER DIES BY ROPE ON FARM

After having appeared in good spirits during the late afternoon and early evening, John Buehler, aged 36, tenant on the Jacob Blumer farm in Washington township about four miles west of Monticello was found hanging by a rope in a feed alley of the barn when his wife went to see why he was detained about 7:30 Friday evening.

She immediately cut the rope summoned neighbors and a physician who worked over him until 10 o'clock without restoring life. Since he had been hanging but a short time and faint heart beats could be detected there was hope at first that blood circulation could be restored.

When he and Mrs. Buehler went to milk and at supper he was jolly, even singing his wife said. She took the lawn mower to the yard later and he went to treat a sick horse. When he did not come back, Mrs. Buehler went in search of him and came upon his hanging form.

Motive for self destruction is unknown since his finances are said to have been in good shape and there were no family troubles. They had no children.

They resided on the Blumer farm about two years.

The deceased was born in New Glarus township Jan. 23, 1888, the son of Alfred Buehler and Regula Disch. On Nov. 9, 1920 he was united in marriage to Ada Babler. During most of his life he had resided in New Glarus township, but the past four years have been spent in Monticello.

His mother preceded him in death 30 years ago, and Mr, Buehler died April 30, 1924, at Lincoln, Neb.

Surviving him are the widow, two brothers and two sisters. They are: Mrs. J. B. Baebler, Monroe; Mrs. Albert Moritz, Monticello; and Fred and Henry Buehler, Peru, Ill.

Funeral services were held at 1 o'clock at the home Monday afternoon. Rev. Muehlmeier, of Monticello, conducted the services.
