Cecil F. Jordan, Monticello, Dies Was Long Active In Cheese Trade

MONTICELLO — Cecil F. Jordan, 63, cheese buyer many years, died at 8:15 a.m. today in his home here following a heart attack.

Mr. Jordan had always worked for cheese firms, first for Arn and Zweifel Cheese Co., now the Monticello Cold Storage.

He was born Nov. 10, 1897, the son of Fred and Vola Tone Jordan, was graduated from Monticello high school in 1917. On Dec. 1, 1921, he was married to Barbara Zentner.

His father was a longtime Monticello village Marshall killed on duty March 7, 1930. The marshal was shot by Gottfried Gottier Jr. Twelve days later Dr. Edward Blumer, village president and only physician, died of pneumonia. He had hurried from his home, partially clothed, to treat Fred Jordan. Gottier was convicted.

Surviving Mr. Jordan are his wife; a daughter, Mrs. Coles L'Hommedieu, Bellevue, Neb.; a sister, Mrs. R. W. Nelson, Madison; and two grandsons, William and Robert L'Hommedieu. His mother died July 22, 1950, and a sister, Miss Carol, Nov. 29, 1957.

Jordan was a member of Zwingli church, Masonic lodge and Amstutz-Marty American Legion Post. He was in the student army training corps at the University of Wisconsin in the latter part of World War I.

Arrangements are pending at the Voegeli funeral home. The daughter is to arrive here tonight. Her husband, a career Army man, is being located in California.
