Monticello Area Historical Society News

The following Monticello Fire Department history was provided by Robert Buehl and will be continued in the next newsletter.

September 1892, the first chief was Fred Knobel. A dozen rubber coats and hats, a 16 foot ladder for the Hook & Ladder Co., two pike poles and a fire bell purchased in 1893. A fire call consisted of three taps on the fire bell, a continuous ringing of the bell for a five alarm fire. A motion was passed to give the first person to answer a fire call with a team and wagon a \$5 prize. A hose cart capable of carrying 500 feet of hose purchased 1894. Hosemen were Dan Wichser and Rudy Neuenschwander. Nozzlemen were Frank Taft and Dane Richards. Joe Booker tested the engine. Bought two benches for the firemen. A nickel plated trumpet for company use purchased. An oyster supper for firemen and wives or best girlfriends was held. Fire alarm practice from the first tap of the bell until the first stream of water at the Baptist Church took 4 1/2 minutes in 1897. That year was a Fireman's Tournament in Monroe, the firemen went by train and participated in contests such as Hub race, Chief's foot race, Hook & Ladder, Tug of War, bicycle race and hose race. There were prizes of \$10, \$5 and \$3. That year parade coats and caps were purchased as they attended a parade at Belleville. 1898 a motion made that four members of the fire company that enlisted in military service be honorary members until they return. A resolution: Whereas it has pleased the great ruler of the universe to remove from our company our worthy and esteemed member Appleton Taft. Any member elected to the company and not attending the first three meetings be discharged. Firemen's dances proved to not always be profitable. By 1902 the old engine could not be repaired, a new gas engine purchased. A motion made and carried to

pay \$5 per week to any member injured while on duty, not to exceed 10 weeks. It was agreed to let Monroe use the cart and new ball bearing nozzle and coupling. Perhaps the beginning of mutual aid!! Henry Jungst succeeded Fred Gerber, the local undertaker as Chief and was to receive \$15 annual salary. In 1913 a motion passed to tax any member 10 cents for each failure to appear at a regular meeting and 50 cents for failure to appear at a fire call unless he has a reasonable excuse. Failure to pay 3 consecutive times results in expulsion. Voted to have the Village buy a fire whistle to be put on the Electric plant. Confer with the Village in regard to trading the old engine for a chemical engine. John Zweifel elected Chief 1916-1926. Each member to pay \$5 for uniform to be reimbursed when turned in. Jake Krieg, Gerrit Kooreman, Henry J. Elmer and Dick Zentner appointed drivers for fire truck 1927.


