Succumbs to Sickness of Several Weeks' Duration

Funeral services for Mrs. Hannah Clark, 83 years of age, esteemed Monticello woman, whose death occurred Friday evening at the home of her son, Charles W. Clark, following an illness of several weeks' duration, were conducted at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon in the Clark home.

The rites were conducted by A. E. Bloom, Chicago, former pastor of the Advent Christian church in Monticello. Interment was in the Railroad avenue cemetery.

Hannah Barlow, daughter of Richard and Ann Barlow, was born in Derbyshire, England, on January 1, 1847. The family came to America when she was eight years old, settling near Monroe, Wis. She was married to William H. Clark at Monticello on March 17th, 1867, by Elder William Sheldon.

Two sons and one daughter were born to them: Charles, Monticello; Wesley, Greeley, Colo.; and Daisy, who died in 1914.

For many years, Mr. and Mrs. Clark were valued members of the Advent Christian church of Monticello, and their home was the resting place for many who came to attend the services or to preach the Gospel there.

Her husband, William, died in 1911, but Mrs. Clark continued to reside here until she was claimed by death after an illness of about three months' duration. She passed away Friday evening, August 1, 1930, at the old home, now the home of her son, Charles, and his family, at the advanced age of 83 years and seven months.

She leaves to mourn her loss two sons, already. mentioned: three brothers, Charles and Will. of Clear Lake; Iowa; and J. H., Monticello; also three sisters. Mrs. Emma Runquist, of Mendota, Ill. Mrs. Alice Noble, of near St. Paul, Minn., and Mrs. Elizabeth Stout, Monticello. There are also two grandchildren, Frank and Vera, a number of more or less distant relatives and a host of friends from near and far, with whom she had been associated in church and social life.

The funeral services were held at her late home on Railroad avenue Sunday afternoon, August 8, 1930, conducted by Elder A. E. Bloom, Chicago, who was her pastor for 11 years. His theme for the funeral sermon was "God's Beautiful World," based on the text in Revelation 21:5, "And He that sat upon the throne said, "Behold I make all things new." Mrs. Sally Wright and Mrs. Stella Abbott, sang two beautiful selections and the Pastor, by special request, sang one of his own compositions, "That Beautiful Land."

She was laid to rest beside her husband in the family lot in the Railroad avenue cemetery, in the shadow of the church where for years they had worshiped, being borne to her resting place by Clarence, Reuel and Wendell Barlow, Frank Emmons, Merle Frautschy and Cecil Jordan.
