Jacob Dick, Native Of Vicinity, Passes Death Caused By Stroke Suffered Few Hours Earlier

Funeral services for Jacob Dick, 58 years of age, a native of Washington township and former resident of Monticello and Monroe, who died suddenly and unexpectedly in the Madison General hospital at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon, were conducted in Monticello at 1:30 Wednesday afternoon in the Voegeli funeral home and at 2 in the Reformed church.

Rev. A. Muehlmeier, pastor of the church, had charge of the services which were followed by interment in Highland cemetery here.

Born July 17, 1875

A native of, Washington township, where he was born July 17, 1875, Mr. Dick was the son of Mr. and Mrs. John and Verena Isely Dick.

Mr. Dick grew to manhood on the homestead farm, attending the neighborhood rural schools. He attended a business college in Madison, after which he spent several years in Milwaukee, Rice Lake, and Redfield, S. D. After returning to Monticello, he was employed by the Edw. Wittwer Cheese company.

Later on Mr. Dick was located at Argyle where he was buyer for a Milwaukee cheese concern. For 11 years he managed the Farmers' Cooperative Cheese cold storage plant in Monroe, but for the past four years. had been located in Madison where he resided at the home of his sister, Mrs. John Klossner.

Several Survivors

Surviving Mr. Dick are two brothers, John, who is a member of the Peoples Supply company firm here, and Robert, Le Roy, Minn.; and four sisters, Mrs. Rosa Wittwer, Mrs. Louisa Staedtler, Mrs. Anna Klossner, and Mrs. Minnie Mary, all of Madison.
