### **DEATH OF MRS. JACOB HOLLOWAY**

#### **Well Known Washington Twp. Lady Expires on Sunday**

Mrs Jacob Holloway, an esteemed and well known lady of Washington township, passed away on Sunday at 8:45 a. m. Her passing was due to pneumonia with which she had been ill and confined for two weeks. She was taken ill with a severe cold two weeks ago Friday, which developed into pneumonia and which was responsible for her death, Mrs. Holloway was a daughter of Mr and Mrs. J. C. Simmons, born in Skyler county, Ohio, who moved to this county in an early day. She was married in 1861 in Jefferson to Mr. Holloway, and after residing for one year in Monroe township, moved to the farm in Washington, that was her home for so many years. Mrs. Holloway was known to a large number and had a host of warm friends in the county. She was a member of the Methodist church for sixteen years and there found vent for the charitable, christian nature which brought to her such sincere admiration from among her circle of friends and acquaintances. She was one of those women who found the greatest joy in life in providing home comforts for the children, but was always ready and willing to go outside where duty called to carry aid or comfort to others. She lived a thorough christian life, was happy and content and resigned at the end. She was admired for many fine virtues and while there is sorrow at her passing, there is consolation in the fact that the world is better that she has lived.

Mrs. Holloway was one of fourteen children and is the fourth of the number to pass away. Her husband, ten brothers and sisters and the following children survive her: Percy Holloway, Washington; Mrs. Nellie Wallace, Oshkosh; Preston J. Holloway, Washington; John W, Monroe; Mrs. Theo. Withers, Eau Claire, and A. A. Holloway, Milwaukee.

The, funeral services were held on Tuesday at 1 o'clock at the home, Rev. Goodell of the Methodist church, officiated and interment was in Greenwood cemetery.
