Long Illness Fatal To Mrs. John (Anna) Moritz Death Takes Place Sunday A. M.; Funeral Rites Wednesday July 11, 1881 – Feb. 24, 1935

Funeral services for Mrs. John Moritz, 53 years of age, highly esteemed Monticello resident, whose death after a lingering illness from tuberculosis occurred in the Deaconess hospital at Monroe at 7 a. m. Sunday, were conducted at 1:30 p. m. Wednesday in the Moritz home on Monroe street and at 2 in the Reformed church.

Rev. A. Muehlmeier, pastor of the local church, had charge of the services. Interment was in the Reformed church cemetery in Washington township, the community in which Mrs. Moritz was born and later resided for a long term of years before moving to Monticello.

Born July 11, 1881

A native of Washington township, Anna Marie Marty was born July 11, 1881, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles R. Marty, Sr. She was united in marriage to John Moritz in Monticello Nov. 27, 1900. The couple resided on the former Moritz farm in that township until eight years ago when they retired from farming and moved to the village to make their home.

Mrs. Moritz had not been in robust health for many years. Several years ago she and Mr. Moritz spent the winter months in the south for the benefit of her health. After returning home her health remained fairly good until about four years ago, when her condition again became serious, and she was removed to a Madison hospital. After leaving the hospital she was bedfast for several months but finally recuperated and had suffered no setbacks until stricken a few weeks ago.

Mrs. Moritz was active in church circles, having been a member of the Reformed church and its Ladies' Aid society.

Besides the husband, the deceased is survived by one son, Ernest J. Moritz, Monticello; two brothers, Henry R. Marty, Roberts, Wis., and Charles R. Marty, Washington township, and two grandchildren, Marion and Lou Ann Moritz, both of Monticello.

She was preceded in death by her parents, one son, Herman, and a grandson, Carl.
