Jacob Schuler May 4, 1855 – Sept. 1930 FINAL RITES FOR JACOB SCHULER Passes Away Suddenly and Unexpectedly at 8 Sunday Evening Following Brief Illness

Final rites for Jacob Schuler, 75 years of age, esteemed Monticello citizen, whose sudden and unexpected passing occurred in his home here at 8 o'clock Sunday evening came as a great shock to relatives and friends alike, were conducted at 1:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon in the Schuler home on Monroe street and at 2 in the Reformed church. The services were in charge of Rev. A. Muehlmeier, pastor of the church. Interment was in Highland cemetery.

The death of Mr. Schuler followed a short illness, during which his condition was never regarded as serious. He had been confined to bed only four days and many of his neighbors and acquaintances were not even aware that he was sick. The cause of Mr. Schuler's passing was chronic myocarditis, while generalized arteriosclerosis was contributory.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Christ and Rose Blum Schuler, the deceased was a native of Cincinnati, Ohio, where he was born May 4, 1855. At the age of six months, he accompanied his parents to Washington township where they settled on a farm. Mr. Schuler's entire life, with the exception of six months in infancy, were spent in or near this village.

For 20 years, Mr. Schuler was engaged in farming three and one-half miles west of Monticello. His marriage to Miss Varana Zweifel, of New Glarus, took place at Albany on Jan. 2, 1882. Retiring from farming, the couple moved to Monticello where they have since resided,

Mr. Schuler will be remembered as a man whose genial personality and upright qualities earned for him the esteem of many friends and acquaintances. Not only was he a kind and considerate husband and father, but he was a worthy citizen who was a credit to the community in which he lived.

Survivors besides the widow are three daughters, Mrs. R. M. Panzer, Minneapolis; Mrs. E. A. Bontly, Washington township; and Mrs. Albert W. Becker, Madison; two sons, Gilbert, Orfordville, and Adam, at home; one granddaughter, Betty Lou Becker, Madison; one sister, Mrs. Fred S. Blum, Monticello; and two brothers, William C., Madison, and Casper, Monroe. Two children died in infancy.
