FRANK K. STUDLEY IS NO MORE.

Death Relieves His Suffering After an Illness of Five Months. March 8, 1833 - 29 Oct. 1905

Frank K. Studley, for years a well known and highly respected citizen of the county, passed away at his home in Monroe at 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon, after a protracted illness extending over a period of five months. His illness had its beginning with an abscess of the leg which so weakened him that he could not regain his vitality and a general break-down ensued. At no time did his condition indicate any organic trouble.

The deceased was a gentleman of true worth in every sense of the word and one whose integrity and honesty of purpose was never questioned. His death will be deeply mourned by many warm friends throughout the county.

Mr. Studley was a native of Massachusetts, born at Zarnmouth, March 8, 1833, During his early years he followed a seafaring life and at the age of 23 years became master mariner, his trade being in the Gulf of Mexico and the West Indies. During his life on the seas Mr. Studley visited many foreign ports and sailed entirely around the world. He abandoned the sea in 1860 and came to Green county, engaging in farming just south of this village. He was engaged as manager of the Grange store in 1875, in which capacity he served two years. He moved to Monroe in January, 1877, having been elected to the office of sheriff, the duties of which he creditably discharged for two terms. He was engaged in the drug and grocery business in Monroe with A. F.. Lichtenwainer until 1887, and about the same year he engaged in the lumber business in this village, continuing his interest in the same until a few months age.

Mr. Studley was married in 1858 to Eliza A. Crowell, the widow who survives him, together with three children—Mrs. Wayne D. Marsh, of Battle Creek, Mich.; Geo. G. Studley, of Algona, Iowa; and Orrin B. Studley, of Chicago.

The deceased was a charter member of the local Odd Fellows lodge, later transferring to the Monroe lodge, under whose auspices the funeral will be held Wednesday at 2 o'clock from the house.
