Mrs, Henry Zentner Expires After Long Sickness; Rites Held Rev. A. R. Achtemeier Has Charge of Services Tuesday

Funeral services for Mrs. Henry Zentner, 50 years of age, who passed away at 6:15 Friday evening at the home of a sister, Mrs. W. S. Hoesly, Highland street, following an illness which had its inception last spring, were conducted at 1:30 Tuesday afternoon in the Voegeli funeral home and at 2 in the Zwingli Reformed church.

Rev. A. R. Achtemeier, church pastor, officiated. Burial was in Highland cemetery. Pallbearers were: Delmar Stuessy and Earl Voegeli, New Glarus; Clarence Hoesly, Brooklyn; Edward and Henry Zentner and Walter Voegeli, Exeter township.

Failed for Months

Mrs. Zentner, who had always been an energetic and active person, first became ill last April and for many months continued to grow weaker. On several occasions during that time she had been a patient in the Deaconess hospital, Monroe. Examinations finally proved that Mrs. Zentner was suffering from a brain tumor, the location of which made it impossible for surgeons to remove the growth.

Born in Adams

Kathryn Voegeli was a native of Adams township, having been born Feb. 29, 1888, the daughter of Matt and Emma Blum Voegeli. She was united in marriage Jan. 9, 1908, to Henry Zentner, the ceremony being performed by Rev. Carl Heyl, former pastor of the Reformed church. For a time they followed the vocation of farming west of Monticello. Subsequently they moved to Monticello and established their home at the northeast edge of the village. Mr. Zentner followed the carpenter trade for many years.

Sterling Character

Mrs. Zentner was the possessor of many sterling qualities and her death has occasioned sincere regret among a large circle of friends in this vicinity and elsewhere. Mrs. Zentner was possessed of an unusually pleasant disposition and she never failed to greet her friends with a smile upon meeting them. Not only was she a devoted wife and mother but an ideal neighbor as well and had always been held in the highest esteem by those whom she numbered among her acquaintances.

Mrs. Zentner was a member of the Zwingli Reformed church.

Surviving to mourn her passing are the bereaved husband, one son, Matt, Monticello; two brothers, Thomas Voegeli, Exeter township, and Fred Voegeli, New Glarus; five sisters, Mrs. Bertha Stuessy and Mrs. Alma Gmur, New Glarus, Mrs. Sarah Hoesly, Brooklyn, and Mrs. Wilbert S.
